

Blackberry-Picking is an educational experience based on Seamus Heaney's much-loved poem of the same name tailored to Key Stage One pupils which includes: an abridged exhibition tour, perfect for younger visitors; a shared storytelling session; a tasty Blackberry Picnic; and an opportunity to be creative using blackberry ink. Curriculum Areas of Learning addressed by this programme:

### **Communication**

*Pupils should be provided with opportunities to:*

- listen to, respond to, explore a wide range of stories and poems;
- talk about stories, expressing thoughts, feelings, and opinions in response to literature;
- participate in shared reading activities, read and be read to a wide selection of poetry
- use a range of comprehension skills to discuss and interpret texts
- use evidence from texts to explain opinions
- understand and use a wide range of vocabulary in their writing, write without prompting, making their own word choices, participate in shared, guided, independent writing

### **The World Around Us**

*Pupils should be provided with opportunities to explore:*

- interdependence of people and the environment;
- change over time in local places;
- ways in which change occurs in the natural world

### **Personal Development and Mutual Understanding**

*Pupils should be provided with opportunities to:*

- develop knowledge, understanding and skills in their own and others' feelings and emotions and how their actions affect others;
- develop their self-esteem and self-confidence;
- treat each other with responsibility and respect, honesty and fairness

### **The Arts**

*Pupils should be provided with opportunities to:*

- investigate and respond to direct sensory experience; including visual, verbal, spatial and tactile dimensions, memory and imagination;
- look at and talk about resource material to stimulate their own ideas;
- explore the visual elements of colour, tone, line, shape, form, space, texture and pattern to express ideas;
- talk about their own and others' work and how it was made, use observations to identify difficulties and suggest modifications;
- experiment with a range of media, materials, tools and processes
